**7 DAYLIGHT SAVING ACT. Initiative.**

**HUNTINGTON LIBRARY AND ART GALLERY.** Senate Constitutional Amendment 9. Adds Section 15 to Article IX of Constitution. Confirms trusts and estates created for Henry E. Empowers Legislature by general laws to provide for formation, organization and regulation of corporations, prescribe their powers, rights, duties and liabilities, and those of their officers, stockholders and members, and provide for extension of term of existence of all corporations formed for limited period, but shall not extend franchise of any quasi-public corporation nor remit forfeiture thereof. Declares present laws concerning corporations and those hereafter passed pursuant hereto may be altered or repealed.
